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Units of Study

Short Fiction I (September 8th to September 25th)

- We will review the use of reading notes and the writing process.
- We will have a general overview of the multi-genre project requirements.
- A focus will be on prose so that the literary response techniques can be perfected.
- In-class work: analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook, diagnostic assessments.
- Performance Tasks: Short responses, Short Story Seminar.

Poetry I (September 28th to October 9th)

- We will study poetic techniques such as literary devices and structure.
- *In-class work:* analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook.
- *Performance Tasks:* sonnet, short responses.
- I.S. Conference #1 Week of October 5th.

Long Fiction I (October 12th to November 20th)

- We will review the tragic plot structure (classic and modern) while studying *Hamlet*.
- In-class work: analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook.
- *Performance Tasks:* Servant's Tale, essay response, multiple choice questions.
- I.S. Conference #2 Week of November 9th.
- November 13th: Midterm Examination (Multiple Choice Portion)

Short Fiction II and Poetry II (November 23rd to December 4th)

- We will discuss the multi-genre project requirements as well as the consequences of plagiarism.
- A variety of short texts (poetry and prose) will be studied so that the literary response techniques can be perfected.
- In-class work: analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook, diagnostic assessments.
- Performance Tasks: Sonnet, Essay response, flash fiction writing.
- ISU Essay Week of November 23rd.

Long Fiction II (December 7th to December 18th)

- We will review dramatic terminology while studying *Death of a Salesman*. Focus will be on stereotypes and the American Dream.
- *In-class work:* analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook.
- Performance Tasks: Socratic Seminar, stereotype poster, I.S. Conference #2.
- Multi-Genre Project Week of December 13th.
- Students begin reading and notetaking for *Three Day Road*.

Short Fiction III and Poetry III (January 4th to January 15th)

- A variety of short texts (poetry and prose) will be studied so that the literary response techniques can be perfected.
- In-class work: analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook, diagnostic assessments.
- *Performance Tasks:* comparison essay response.
- MGP Presentations Week of January 4th.

Long Fiction III (January 18th to January 22nd)

- This Unit will involve an in-depth study of the novel *Three Day Road* by Joseph Boyden.
- *In-class work:* analysis questions, critical reading journal, writer's notebook.
- *Performance Tasks:* timed essay prompt, literature circle log, diagnostic exam.
